In 1787 four freighters, Oney McCoy, Charles McLaughlin, Jim Myers and Tom Smith were killed in Blue Mountains , between Pendleton and Meacham. The scene was known as deadman's hill. Freighters killed by Indians.

Jim Kanine was last Walla Walla chief

Sap at Kloni

Means White Swan in Umatilla tongue. He was next to the last chief of the Walla Wallas. He was born at Wallula about 1854. His mother was a Cayuse, his father was a Umatilla named Westconne or called Old George.

His mother was Schmamoosh or Old Woman.

He died at his home at Cayuse, March 6, 1936 and was buried at Homli cemetery.

Pendleton Library

Allen Patawa died Jan & 7, 1941 after emergency operation for appendicitis.

Born Feb. 13, 1880, at site of present county courthouse (At Pendleton)
Moved to McKay Creek. His mother was Ip nal o talikt. His father
was Hi Yume ma pe ka Loukt (~~Gadidly~~) (Grizzly Bear Looks Around)
Was social and roundup chief for the Umatillas.

His camp was at Cayuse Station above the mission agency, six miles
east of Pendleton.
