Dear Pearce:

This will authorize you to pickup two valuable bronze sculptures from the Herron Museum of Art, Indianapolis, identifiable as The Last Drummer and Medicine Singer.

These bronzes were shipped to the museum last April 5, together with check in the amount of \$8.30 shipping charges and \$2.30 carriage insurance, (\$10.60).

They were available for return after April 27, and now, nearly a month later no word as to their return has been received.

They were sent in a packing box which included the return address on the back of the top, so all necessary is to nail the lid back on after they are placed in the box and deliver it to the American Railway Express.

Since these bronzes carried also a blanket policy, protecting them during their entire absence from Yakima, the return carriage insurance, \$1,000 is a mere token of their value.

Your identification as my brother should be sufficient to have them released to your care, and it is directed that the museum does this, immediately or face the consequence of an immediate damage suit, because I could have disposed of them and they are irreplaceable.
