AN INVITATION

You are cordially invited to attend the first annual Hay Palace Fair which will be held at Mabton, Washington, commencing Wednesday morning, Sept. 15th, and closing Saturday night, Sept. 18th, 1915.

The Fair is absolutely original as well as unique; it is distinctive of Mabton and vicinity; has never been attempted anywhere else; and it promises to win the attention it deserves and the support it should have from those interested in their own welfare.

The first object is to bring the grower and buyer together without the use of middlemen and the elimination of commissions at both ends of the line. The second object is the benefit to be derived from a more prosperous producer and a wealthier community. With this object in view all those connected with the management are giving their time and attention to the success of this event absolutely gratis, and the business men of Mabton are subscribing what funds will be needed, over and above the gate receipts, to finance it.

It is planned to make this the largest event of its kind that has ever been attempted in this part of the State outside of the State Fair. The Hay Palace will require about 600 tons of first grade baled alfalfa hay in its construction, and all we are asking of the farmers is the use of this hay for this Palace during the Fair. Each load will be weighed and inspected by the State Inspector as hauled in; the owner will be given a receipt for the weight and number of bales; at the close of the Fair this hay will be sold at auction to the highest bidder, whose bid must be at least as much as the market price, and each owner will be paid the price per ton bid by the buyer for the number of pounds he holds receipts for. In this way, the Fair makes good any shortage from shrinkage or loss in handling. Tarpaulins have been

This Hay Palace has been so widely advertised that we confidently expect the majority of the large hay buyers of the State present to bid on this hay, and it is reasonable to expect that it will bring considerable more per ton than you could get for it in any other way, and, for the present, this is the sole object of this Fair.

There will be housed within this Hay Palace the largest and most diversified exhibit of farm products, live stock and machinery ever assembled in this part of the Yakima valley, and if our plan works out to advantage on the hay this year there is no reason why it cannot be worked in the same way on potatoes, corn, fruit and other products of the farm, at future fairs. We plan to have these annually.

The very best speakers in their several lines to be obtained have been engaged for the occasion, including Governor Ernest Lister, Mr. W. H. Paulhamus, Prof. Wm. Hislop, Mr. E. G. Schafer, Mr. Sam Hill, Mr. C. E. Arney, Mr. C. L. Smith and Mr. R. D. Jarboe. These men are experts in their several lines and are coming here to give you the benefit, free gratis, of their experiences. Mr. Jarboe is the Chief Hay and Grain Inspector of the State and will explain to you the new hay grades established recently by the Public Service Commission and the operation of his Department at the terminals. This will be well worth your time and should not be missed.

Plenty of attractions have been arranged for to fill the time of each day and provide a variety of amusement and educational features. Particulars can be obtained from the "posters" and newspaper advertisements.

ANNOUNCEMENT

The Second Annual Hay Palace Fair will be held in Mabton, Washington, from Sept. 12th to 16th, both inclusive, 1916, and we are assured by the success of last year's event that the success of this year will be little short of wonderful, if we profit at all by experiences of the past.

Sufficiently early notice of the dates was given to enable the growers and exhibitors to begin in ample time to insure worthy exhibits. This improvement over our late start of last year, together with the added encouragement of those who held back last year, fearing a failure, will fill our space with the best grade of exhibits that have ever been brought together in the Yakima Valley, which overtops all other valleys.

The special grand prizes being offered this year are the largest that have ever been attempted in this State, and, as far as we can learn, in any other State. We are offering \$100 in gold for the best ten ears of corn; \$100 in gold for the best bushel of potatoes; \$50 in gold for the best boar, any breed, any age over 3 months; and \$50 in gold for the best sow, any breed, any age over 3 months. Following up the object and aim we started with, to encourage the growing of better stuff in the principal and most important crops of the community, and then the bringing of the grower and buyer together on common ground, we feel that these premiums are commendable and should be appreciated sufficiently by

On Saturday the 16th, the last day of the Fair, there will be held a hay growers' and hay buyers' convention. The object of this is to give these two classes full opportunity to become acquainted and familiar with each other, their aims, ambitions and methods, in the interest of better business relations in the future. At this time every hay grower should be prepared to advise buyers of the number of tons of hay they have, and its grade and the price asked, in case of a desire to purchase. On this day at 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon the hay in the Hay Palace will be sold at auction as usual, and in this connection I will add that this year it is planned to send a representative to the Sound to interest every large hay user in our Fair and persuade them to attend for the purpose of bidding in the auction sale. Users especially will be solicited this year.

This year we wish to call special attention to the Boys' Judging Contest we are featuring. This will take place on Tuesday the 12th, and their work will be judged by the regular judges and the premiums awarded on Wednesday the 13th. Owing to delay in securing some of the necessary data full particulars cannot be given at this time but will be ready for distribution upon request within a few days. Thirty dollars will be awarded in premiums and the judging will be in connection with cattle, hogs, corn and potatoes. There will be a wide field for activities in these lines on account of extra large premiums. Every school in the County should be represented in this contest and it is certain that even other counties will be represented. You should see to it that they do not carry off the honors.

The boys' judging contest has been broadened this year to include apples and dairy herds and this contest will take place on Tuesday the 11th. You will find the details elsewhere in this booklet. We hope this contest will be even more interesting, and more widely participated in, and that it will surpass in interest the contest of last year.

Sufficiently large and creditable exhibitors' admissions refunded.

Privilege tickets will be issued upon the following basis only:

One concession ticket, without charge, where the amount of license fee amounts to \$10.00 or more; tickets at \$1.00 each to all others, except attendants or helpers actually employed by the week, who shall pay 50c each, upon application properly signed by the employer. Concession or privilege tickets are not transferable and any abuse of attendants' or helpers' tickets will result in their forfeiture.

HORSEMEN'S TICKETS

All horsemen will be charged the nominal sum of fifty cents (50c) for each ticket or badge issued to owner, driver, trainer, jockey or groom. No passes will be issued. Owners in attendance must sign applications for their employers' tickets and will be held accountable for the abuse of same.

Officers of the Fair are authorized to take up all tickets found in the possession of anyone, other than the rightful owner. All tickets for horsemen, grooms and other keepers will hereafter be issued on proper identification only.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

RULE 1.

The general supervision of the grounds and entire exhibition, the police regulations and entrance and exit gate, are vested in the President of the Hay Palace Fair.

Any person knowingly violating any of the rules will thereby forfeit and may be de-

special premiums being offered by individuals who are public spirited enough to do everything within their power to make this Fair a complete success from every standpoint, because they readily recognize the great benefit it will be to the community and its people as a success, and what a mark of demerit it will be as a failure, in which case it would directly affect every person in the community adversely. See the special premium list on another page.

Realizing that Directors could not be secured for each year's Fair that would be willing to do all the work incident thereto free gratis and pay their own expenses, and besides assume the risk of bad weather during the fair which would not only leave them loaded with unpaid bills for which they would be personally liable, but might also leave them with damaged hay on their hands for which to pay, we decided the only possible way to assure continuance of the enterprise would be to incorporate and buy a permanent site upon which to erect permanent improvements. The people were called together and the matter explained, whereupon they proceeded to incorporate and since then have purchased 16½ acres of a fine alfalfa field adjoining the corporate limits of town, for \$3250, upon which there has been paid \$1250 from stock sales. The balance is on comparatively easy terms. This tract will be fenced this year and such other improvements made as are possible with the amount of money available for that purpose.

It is to be seriously regretted that every person in and around Mabton cannot take the time to make a trip around the County and State with a view to learning how this FAIR is looked upon by others than ourselves and what their opinion of it is, and how much credit they concede Mabton for being sufficiently alive to invent and stage such a unique

barred from receiving any premium that may be awarded him or her. Exhibitors should also note special rules at the head of each department.

EXHIBITS.

1. The Fair Grounds will be open for the reception of articles two days before the commencement of the Fair. Articles other than stock may be shipped to the Secretary, but the transportation charges must be fully prepaid and in no case will they be brought into the grounds and placed on exhibition except by, and at the expense and risk of the owner or his authorized agent.

ENTRIES.

2. Entries may be made with the Secretary either by mail or in person any time after September 1st. They should be made on regular entry blanks furnished free on application to the Hay Palace Fair, and sent in as early as possible so that space may be allotted and tags made ready for exhibitor.

3. Entries close September 14th, 9:00 p. m.

The right is reserved to accept entries later than the dates given above, but in case this is done, a penalty of 20 per cent of the premium earned by said entry, may be charged.

4. Exhibitors may not make more than one entry in any lot except in livestock classes where not more than two entries may be made. No exhibitor will be awarded more than one cash prize in each lot, except in livestock classes, where not to exceed two cash prizes in one lot may be won by an exhibitor, provided there is competition in that particular lot.

5. No animal or article will be allowed to compete for more than one premium (specials)

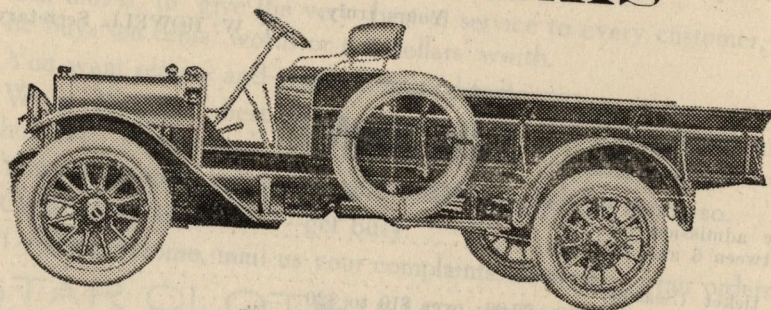

3. All cattle must be halterbroke and led in the arena by an attendant.

4. The Hay Palace Fair, while using every precaution, will not be responsible for loss or damage to any article or animal. Nor will any officer or employe of the fair be permitted to negotiate insurance, or make any guarantee whatsoever regarding same. Property owners desiring insurance against fire or other protection must make their own arrangements therefor. No officer or employe has any authority to suspend or change this rule.

Entries to close September 10 and it shall be optional with the Fair whether any entries are received after that date; and if received, 20 per cent of the premium so earned shall be forfeited to the Fair.

5. The Fair grounds will be opened to the reception of livestock one day before the com-
