



The following Indian and Eskimo arts and crafts businesses are privately owned and operated 1/ by Indian or Eskimo designer-craftsmen or artists who design, produce and market their exclusive products, often in combination with the products of other Native craftsmen; or 2/ by Indian or Eskimo merchants who retail and/or wholesale authentic Indian and Eskimo arts and crafts products.

The majority of the sources listed are retail shops, and visitors to the areas or reservations where they are located are especially welcomed. As noted in the entries, many offer special visitor attractions. Some have mail order services. Each business handles its own transactions, and product and price information can be obtained direct from each source.
