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dear Mellens. You may like one of my
mothers booklets from a historical
standpoint but more important
she helped establish some of the
most important facts concerning
The Lewis & Clark expedition and
the value to them of the little Indian
girl Sacajawea. They could have
gone no farther when they reached
the spot Lewis named Camp Fortunate
in Montana ($\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile below our
ranch where I was born & lived till 12)
unless they could obtain horses from
the Indians. The Indians were not
friendly (in fact plotted to kill the white
men) until the very dramatic fact

developed that Sasajivea was
the sister of The Chief Cameahwait.
Then they were given horses & guides to
lead them over the mountain pass into
Idaho & the coast.

I have a beautiful picture of the
monument designed by my mother as
Chmn of historic spots for DAK & Federated Clubs
of Montana. The bronze plate given and
inscribed by Anaconda Copper Co and
the concrete marker built by the State
of Montana. It is kept in honor of
"Laura Tolman Scott (my mother)"
Do stop & see it some day. I have no
car so I can't bring it to you.
