



Miss (Indian) America Pageant






The tipi campground forms an impressive setting for the traditional out-of-door interdenominational religious service which is sponsored by the Sheridan County Council of Churches.



INDIAN CAMPGROUND

Following each performance visitors will have the opportunity to walk thru the campground and visit with the Indian people.



In 1907, tribesmen gathered in Sheridan and buried the hatchet of bitter feelings by staging a goodwill show. This was the forerunner of the present All American Indian Days. The presentation of dances, ceremonies, games, arts and crafts during the three day show have become an invaluable means of preserving the Indian culture . . .
