He was also with the group of men who went to Chief Moses' camp to ask him to turn over the murderers. My dad had a big part in this whole affair - My mother at that time was a girl of about 12 yrs. old. She helped carry sod to build a big fort.

If you can go back to old issues of your paper - about 1928-32 - some where in there - you could find articles written concerning the trouble at that time and

in it. There may
be a series of his
writing on that subject.
I am not sure - But
I wish you could
look up those issues.

My father also
carried mail on horse-
back and was chased
by the Indians - I have
heard him speak
of those things often
but I did not
realize the importance
of recording such
things and paid too
little attention to his
interest in it. He
lived it over and over

and loved to talk
about it. Of course
his viewpoint was
with the Whites -
