

Andland, N. O., Jersey, 2nd. 1863.

Brother Stewart:

Your letter, photo & other favors were duly received with warmest thanks. Was sorry to hear of your mishap. I shall miss you from the Press, but hope to hear from you in your new walk. By the way, what is the Press going to do about it? A line & a paper will always be welcome & quick response.

I parted with all my photos. before leaving Honolulu, but enclose a line to Montana who will doubtless send you one. Thanks for yours. When you get those with "bow on" please send me one with autograph, which you should not have neglected in this one.

I enclose the letter asked which will be barely in time to catch you. You may have expected it a month ago, but the steamer departs for Honolulu a few days before the one arriving there. Therefore this is the return mail. Would like a few copies of the Press containing the letter. As the Herald desires my impression of Andland it will republish this. My reason for not complying now are that I have something to say which will come easier, when I leave the colony which will be in about four months. Thanks for your notice of my lava letter. I have another

in last Saturday's Herald which I send you. You will doubtless see it reprinted in the Auckland News which I believe you get.

I have agreed to write a series of on Hawaiian incidents. My next two will be particularly blood curdling.

I read your little "Tourists Guide" with much interest. It covers the ground well.

I suppose your Karaka is all right but Kaw Kawwa hoohe keep me out. Please interpret.

for me come from Frisco please send it down
by one of the presses.
