RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF MANUSCRIPTS IN THE YALE UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

Manuscripts may be examined only upon application to the Librarian of Yale University, on the form provided by the Library for that purpose. Permission to examine manuscripts will be granted, at discretion, for acceptable purposes to properly accredited persons. Such permission to examine manuscripts does not carry with it permission to publish such material, in whole or in part, nor to summarize and publish the contents of such material.

Scholars who apply for the use of manuscript material should outline what they wish to study and indicate when they wish to examine the material, in order that the Library may gather together everything germane to the reader's purpose.

The use of manuscripts is limited to rooms designated for the purpose and under the supervision of the librarian in charge. No manuscript may be taken from the Library without the approval of the Librarian.

Permission to publish a manuscript, any portion of a manuscript, or a summary of the contents of a manuscript will ordinarily be granted to properly qualified applicants if circumstances allow, and if there is no immediate probability that such permission will interfere with the use of manuscripts by members of Yale University. Specific written request for the right to publish must be made to the Library, declaring in what form and where it is intended the material will appear; scholars wishing to publish manuscripts from the Yale collections are urged to make such application before proceeding with research and publishing plans.

If a member of the Faculty or a graduate student of Yale asks that he be granted exclusive rights, for a reasonable time, to publish designated material, the Library may grant such requests. If such rights are granted, the reservations will be invaded only upon receipt of a letter setting forth the text of all passages which the applicant wishes to quote or summarize. Applicants for such reserved material will be referred to the person by whom the manuscripts have been reserved, and the Library will at all times be glad to use its good offices in helping all parties to arrive at an agreement.

In giving permission to copy or publish a manuscript, the Yale University Library does not surrender its own right to print the manuscript or to grant permission to others to print it; nor does the Library assume any responsibility for infringement of copyright or of the publication rights in the manuscript held by the writer, his heirs, executors, or assigns.

If permission to publish is granted, the location of the manuscript shall be indicated in the published work, of which a free copy shall be presented to the Yale University Library as soon as the work is published.

Manuscripts deposited in the Library subject to the jurisdiction of the depositor may be consulted only after written authorization has been received from the owner. Manuscripts given to the Library with restrictions on their use may be examined only subject to such restrictions.

Faculty records and similar Yale archival material may ordinarily be used after presentation of written authority from the Dean concerned or the Secretary of the University; Yale doctoral dissertations and masters' theses may be used under the regulations imposed by the Graduate School.

The Yale University Library subscribes to the "Report of the Committee on the Use of Manuscripts by Visiting Scholars" (College and Research Libraries, January 1952), and is anxious to have its collections used, with as few restrictive regulations as possible, in every way consistent with good scholarship and productive research.
