#### Gentlemen:

Enclosed please find an official tabulation of the recent May 6, 1967 General Election for Councilmen held on the Colville Indian Reservation. It will be observed that all of the seven (7) incumbents were re-elected and will be reseated July 13, 1967 and will serve for a two-year term.

The Colville Business Council is composed of 14 members, representing four District; namely: Omak, Nespelem and Inchelium being represented by four councilmen each and Keller District being represented by two councilmen. Each year the terms of one-half or seven councilmen expire.

A total of 1,111 votes were counted and certified by the Election Board of the Business Council, assisted by the Superintendent of the Colville Indian Agency, on the 10th day of May, 1967, of which 535 voted at the precincts and 576 via absentee ballot. The Colville Tribes are one of the few tribes which permit the use of absentee ballots during their General Election for Councilmen.

Of the six candidates endorsed by the Colville Liquidation Promotors (CLP) five were elected; the two incumbents in the Omak and Inchelium Districts and the one incumbent in the Keller District. Mr. Narcisse Nicholson, Jr., incumbent and present Chairman from the Omak District was re-elected for the third two-year term. Mr. Nicholson will have served three successive terms as Chairman of the Colville Business Council at the expiration of the present Council ending July, 1967. The elected officers of the Business Council are elected each year during the Regular Session held the second Thursday of July and consist of a Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary. Councilmen, endorsed by the Colville Liquidation Promotors, favoring termination of federal supervision of the Colville Tribes continue to maintain their majority on the Colville Business Council by a margin of 10 to 4.

On August 1st, Mr. Lyle Keith, Tribal Claims Attorney, Spokane, Washington, advised the Business Council Chairman that through negotiations the Tribal Claims Attorneys have favorably secured a tenative settlement for the Tribes on Claims Dockets 177, 181-A and 181-B, commonly known as the "Reservation Claims", for approximately \$3,500,000.00.

To insure that the tribal membership is properly informed on these Claims, a General Meeting has been scheduled for SATURDAY, August 19, 1967, at the Nespelem Grade School Gymnasium at 11:00 a.m. Mr. Abe Weissbrodt, Tribal Claims Attorney from Washington, D. C. and Mr. Keith will be present at the meeting to give a complete report on the Claims Dockets and proposed settlement and to answer any questions that individual tribal members may wish clarified. It is strongly urged that all tribal members be present since a voting upon the proposed final settlement and disposition of the Claims will be made at the meeting.

A noon luncheon will be served at the meeting. ALL MEMBERS OF THE TRIBE ARE URGED TO ATTEND AND VOTE AT THE MEETING.

#### BRIEF SUMMARY OF CLAIMS DOCKETS 177, 181-A and 181-B

#### CLAIMS DOCKET NO. 177 (Reappraisement Case)

This claim is brought on behalf of the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation to recover losses arising from actions of the Government relating to surplus lands on the Colville Reservation as established by the Executive Order of July 2, 1872. After said lands had been classified, appraised and sold to settlers pursuant to the Act of March 22, 1906, the Government caused the price of the lands to be reduced and also granted to settlers postponements of time to make payments for the land.

#### CLAIMS DOCKET NO. 181-A (Colville, Lake, San Poil, Nespelem, Okanogan and Methow)

This claim is brought on behalf of the above named tribes to recover compensation for the taking by the Government of a substantial part of their lands, fisheries and hunting grounds and settling thereon, without the consent of the claimant tribes, members of the Moses and Joseph bands.

#### CLAIMS DOCKET NO. 181-B (Colville, Lake, San Poil, Nespelem, Okanogan and Methow)

In Docket No. 181-B, a claim is made for additional payment with respect to the Northern part (about 1,500,000 acres) of the July 2, 1872 Reservation lands which the United States took away from these tribes in 1892 without paying fair compensation for the lands.

It is therefore vitally important that the House Subcommittee and parent Committee take action on this measure during this Second Session of the 90% Congress.

One of the incumbents in the Nespelem District elected not to refile.

The Colville Business Council is composed of 14 members, representing four districts on the Reservation, namely: Omak, Wespelem, Keller and Inchelium. Four members represent the Districts of Omak, Nespelem and Inchelium and two council members represent the Keller District. Each year the terms of seven councilmen expire.

A total number of 1364 votes were counted and certified by the Election Board of the Colville Business Council, who were assisted by the Superintendent of the Colville Indian Agency, of which 658 voted at the polls and 706 voted via absentee ballot. The Colville Confederated Tribes are one of the few Tribes which permit the use of absentee voting during their Annual General Election for Councilmen.

The five (5) Incumbents endorsed by the Colville Liquidation Promotors (CLP) in the Inchelium, Keller and Omak Districts were re-elected, thereby retaining a 10-4 majority on the Colville Business Council.
