The poor representation of his work, shown on thecard, speaks louder than I can explain. Incidentally Mr. Quigley, before coming to the Northwest several years ago from Chicago (Art Institute and commercial studio), was the artist who painted the famous bears and cubs calendars of some 20 years ago (cute bears, in difficulty, hunters with cute bear cubs on log over stream being surprised by mother bear, etc. etc. Quig is also a sculptor and wood carver, but doesn't look upon that as good art, holding to strong and good art in his paintings. He has long gone out on trail rides, "wild horse" roundups etc. in Oregon, Washington, Canada, California, Nevada. And owners of places like El Mirador Hotel, Palm Springs, Calif., some big ranchers in Texas, Coloadbo, etc. usually buy what he produces. Hence he will be interested in your catalog and probably knows some of the active or contemporary artists.

Incidentally, too, Mr. Latendorf bought as I recall 10 copies of Drummers and Dreamers, my hard copy book in 1956 (Caxton, Caldwell, Idaho) now out of print. It was issued at \$6. Shorey, at Seattle, catalogued a copy recently at \$17.50. It has appeared at \$12 and \$15 elsewhere in the past year. So, if any happen to be stuck away there in stock, this will give you a guidepost.
