- (1) Provincial Museum: Parliament Buildings. Displays relating to the flora and fauna of this province and an excellent anthropological display of materials relative to the Indian peoples.
- (2) <u>Provincial Archives</u>: Parliament Buildings. A treasure house of manuscripts, books, newspapers and photographs relating to the Pacific Northwest. Feel welcome to come in and browse.
- (3) Helmcken House Historic Museum: l block from Parliament Buildings. The restoration of the oldest home standing in British Columbia, 1852, residence of Dr. J.S. Helmcken, pioneer physician, officer of Hudson's Bay Company and Colonial legislator. Admission 15 cents.
- (4) Maritime Museum of British Columbia: At Signal Hill on Esquimalt Road, about 2 miles out of city centre. Open 11:30 4:30 p.m. Exhibits relate to both naval and merchant marine history on this coast.
- (5) Thunderbird Park: 1 block from Parliament Buildings. An outdoor museum of Indian buildings and totem poles. See Indians at work carving reproductions of the old poles.
