The main college building will not be put up until next year, but dormitories will be built this year and a temporary structure used for recitationrooms, so that a beginning can be made this fall. The course will embrace those studies necessary to prepare pupils to become teachers or enter the higher colleges—— Wkima Herald, May 22, 1890.

The incorporation papers have been forwarded to the auditor of state and on Wednesday, July 9, the trustees will meet and prepare advertisements for building proposals. The college buildings will be located on 60 cres of land near the Ahtanum church which was donated by F.B. Woodcock--Yakima Herald, June 19, 1890.

The dedication services of the new Methodist Eniscopal church on Sunday last was a marked event in the church annals of this section.

The trustees, consisting of Captain J.H. Thomas, Dr. David Rosser, Thomas Kelley, R.S. Morgan, R.K. Nichols, George W. Jones and W.S. Stevens have labored earnestly and untiringly for the success of their undertaking and on Sunday they turned over the church completed, furnished and free from debt.

Dr. Stæratto, chancellor of the willamette University of Salem had been prevailed upon to come here for the oceasion and his learned discourses were listened to with wrapt attention at both morning and evening services by a congregation that filed the large auditorium to its fullest extent.

The church is a large and handsome structure of gothic architecture and calculated to have a seating capacity of three hundred. Its cost complete woodddd was upwards of \$4,500 in addition to which the carpets come to \$260; the new pipe organ \$250 and the pulpit chairs \$60.

The handsome and substantial benches were in the contact for the building of the church and furished by A.F. Switzer.

Although the church is temporarily illuminated by lamps, the electric lights are in and will be used as soon as the power is furnished.
