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SENATE JOINT MEMORIAL No. 16

State of Washington 39th Regular Session By Senators Woodall, Hallauer, Dore, Atwood and Redmon

Read first time February 19, 1965. Under suspension of rules read second and third times February 19, 1965 and passed.

TO THE HONORABLE LYNDON B. JOHNSON, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES,

AND TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE SECRETARY OF INTERIOR:

We, your Memorialists, the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of Washington, in legislative session assembled, most respectfully represent and petition as follows:

WHEREAS, In the United States numerous laws are being passed attempting to insure civil rights to all mankind and to provide equal treatment without respect to national origin; and

WHEREAS, There is in effect today a law commonly known as the Yakima Enrollment Act, being the Act of August 9, 1946 (60 Stat. 969; 25 U.S.§607) which discriminates against the Yakima Indians in their right to determine by will the inalienable right of descent and distribution of their Yakima trust property; and

WHEREAS, Said Act restricts the right of a Yakima Indian to bequeath trust property except to members of the Yakima Tribe with one-fourth degree of Yakima Indian blood; and

WHEREAS, This Act under certain conditions make it impossible for an Indian to bequeath trust property to his or her husband or wife or children; and

WHEREAS, This Act under certain conditions discriminates against and disinherits children as between brothers and sisters, and other relatives; and

WHEREAS, This law not only discriminates as between Indians and non-Indians, it even discriminates between types of Indian blood and

WHEREAS, These are the only people in America who do not have the right to will their property to their own loved ones, and this constitutes discrimination in the extreme;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Washington do respectfully urge that the Congress of the United States do at the earliest possible time devise and approve legislation which will amend the above-entitled law to allow all members of the Yakima Indian tribe to will their property to whom they may desire; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this Memorial be transmitted by the Secretary of State to the President of the United States, the Senators and Representatives from the State of Washington, to the Vice President, and the Chairman of the State Government Committee of the Senate, to the Speaker and the Chairman of the State Government Committee of the House of Representatives, and to the Secretary of Interior.

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
