I have been very interested in your forthcoming book on the Priest Rapids Indians, <u>Drummers and Dreamers</u>. There is a great deal of interest in Northwest history in this community, particularly in the Northwest Indians.

During National Book Week each year, the Richland Public Library has an annual Book Fair which consists of book exhibits, film showings, and literary programs. We have always been interested in obtaining a Northwest author for one of our programs during Book Week. It is my understanding that you will be in Richland around October 6, when your book is released, and if you are able to assist us with our program, we could perhaps arrange to talk this over while you are in Richland.

I purposely set your talk at the Library for 7:30 so you will be able to return to Yakima at a reasonable hour.

Thank you again for your cooperation in assisting us with our Book Week program. I am doubly grateful that you have found time for us when you are so loaded with other activities and you are undoubtedly weary from your recent book tour. I am not convinced that you have "lost your fire".
