Come in spring or fall... for some of the finest fishing and hunting you've enjoyed anywhere.


Come in late spring for mile upon mile of fragrant, dazzling fruit blossoms unrivalled in North America.



Set between three lakes - Kalamalka (lake of



So easy to get there ... so much to fill your days with pleasure

So easily reached and so much to do for so little cost. That's Okanagan vacationing in a quick capsule.

Nowhere else—if it's variety in vacationing you're after . . . the new, the different, the ever-changing scene and pace . . . or just plain relaxing in one spot—does the cost of vacationing pleasure come so modestly.

You need never leave the Okanagan with an empty pocket or without a feeling of wanting to come back again and again.



EASILY REACHED: From Pacific coastal areas, drive via Highway 1 — the Trans-Canada — Vancouver to Hope; thence via scenic Highway 3 over the majestic Hozameen range to Princeton and Keremeos where the Okanagan area begins. Or, there are daily plane, train and bus services.

From inland, in the Pacific Northwest, it's U.S. highway 97 to the border at Oroville. Once across to Osoyoos (stay on 97) you've started your Okanagan vacation. From eastern Canada, completion of the Trans-Canada over Rogers Pass (in 1962) puts Calgary just an easy day's drive away.

SO MUCH TO SEE: Though you can whistle through the Okanagan Valley's 150 miles in hours — and glimpse much — you can spend weeks here and there and still not really see it all.

Off the main highways — and right alongside — are scores of points of interest, many hidden pleasures. In the clearly-designated tourist offices in the cities, they'll gladly plot interesting, scenic side trips for you, point the way to places to visit, things to do. Or enquire at your hotel, motel or campsite — Okanagan people are proud of their homeland and happy to help you enjoy your vacation.

Here are just some of the things you'll want to know about to make your Okanagan visit more interesting, more meaningful.

It's Indian Land: This is former Indian territory from the moment you glide inside its borders. Few are the place names that do not commemorate an Indian past, descrip-



tively vivid: Keremeos: the crossing or swimming place for horses. Penticton: where the people stay all year 'round — or, forever. Naramata: from the denizens of the spirit world. Kelowna: grizzly bear. Vernon: originally 'Hun-cul-deep-moose-chin' — and try that on a resident: the jumping-over place.

But not all is Indian: Oyama, halfway between Kelowna and Vernon was named after a Japanese first war general.

CORNUCOPIA: The Okanagan Valley has many thousands of acres of rich, fertile land which, blessed by climate and nurtured by modern irrigation systems, makes it the prime tree-fruit growing area in Canada. Apples, peaches, pears, plums, apricots, cherries, prunes — the Okanagan has them all, and much besides.

As you travel through the Valley you'll see orchard after orchard resting on the benchlands or drifting lazily down to lakeshore. Visit several. In most, when the fruit is ripe you'll be invited to pick your own fruit at low orchard prices. And if you come in May you'll see a display of blossom such as you've never seen before.

MUCH HISTORY HERE: A little over 100 years ago this was still wild, virgin land. Only the Indians came and went. Then came priest and entrepreneur. The marks they all left endure.

On many a mountain slope you can see pictographs carved and ochred on rock faces to record the lives

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and times of the Indians. Not far out of Kelowna, along the west shore of Lake Okanagan rests the first foothold of white civilization in the Okanagan. It's Okanagan Mission where the first priests settled, and in 1861, the first marriage was performed. In Vernon lies the history of the first Okanagan



stage coach service: Barnards — perpetuated in the name of the city's main street.

All through the Valley look — and enquire — for relics of the fascinating past.

MUCH THAT'S UNIQUE: Where else in North America — or beyond — can you find a lake that changes its many colours before your eyes? Only along the shores of Kalamalka, near Vernon.

Where else so much that's different, unique? Cathedral Lakes — a region of fish-filled glacier lakes — the most striking mountain formations in many miles of mountain country... in the same area, the lovestone or standing rock of peculiar shape with Indian legend attached to it... a mountain that's gashed to spell out the letter 'K'... a whim of nature has fashioned a cliff into a lifelike picture of horse and rider. Osoyoos zucca, monstrous melons weighing 150 pounds at maturity whose


vines spread so quickly you can almost see them grow.

These are but a few of the oddities with which the Okanagan abounds.

LAKE OF MYSTERY: Does Lake Okanagan's 'denizen of the deep', Ogopogo, really exist? Maybe — for many reputable citizens claim they've seen him. He's not, however, the only mystery of the lake. They tell of another big snakelike creature rolling off a rocky point; long, dark objects in the lake; two horses being pulled behind a boat and gobbled up.

And what about 'the Little People'? These, they say, are mermaid-like creatures who've been seen by Squally Point, just south of Kelowna.

Look for yourself, and ... luck!
