I enjoy reading these stories of the real natives of this great country of our--in fact, I like all historical stories. Reading these of yours are more enjoyable because of having known you--it makes me feel real good to hear of one of our own boys make good.

I was happy to hear you are going to make an effort to visit us here this summer. You will have a lot of fun meeting the old gand and I know they will be happy to see you--it shall be quite a treat since it has been so many years since we got together for a meeting. It should be real nice to talk over old times with you. I certainly hope you shall be able to come down and see all of us.

Around June 20th Mother and I leave for our annual fishing trip to Pend O'Reille Lake in Idaho. We have been going up there four or five years now. We like to go there—the fishing is very good and we always bring around 300 fish home for my gang here at the office. They certainly love those Kokamas trout we get up there.

Yesterday was my 72nd birthday and the girls at the office gave me a surprise birthday party at the office. They had cake and punch for me and the entire gang down here. It was very nice for them to do this for me.

Bub and Bea, my son and daughter are sure helping me out with keeping the business going. Things are going along fine. We are having some much needed rain today—so maybe this will make our farmers feel much better and of course this will help our business. Work has been fair—but if we don't get some more water back in the ground there won't be any to pump out—and this won't help our business.

Last fall we went back to Jackson Hole for our usual antelope hunt and the gang went out Saturday and all had our animals and was back in camp by two o'clock. I have a four wheel, six passaginger, international pick-up to do my hunting with. I got darn tired of sitting out in the back of these pick-ups and freezing--I am getting to age where I want and need a little comfort when I do my hunting. Bub and I have taking the truck to Montana to hunt deer with and we certainly appreciated it up there--it was so cold--it was so bad up there this last fall that we didn't go hunting.


