Capt. Tho. Priestley, Fort Simcoe Army
Dear Sir:

I write you to say that Mr. D.D. Taylor has begun his work again upon the Tumwater fishing rights. Old Charlie was beaten up, his head pounded on the rocks and jumped on by two men at work at one of the new Taylor Fisheries. Charlie was standing on one of the old rocks dipping for a fish to eat and to feed his family with. They, the white Taylor men threw the rod and into the river took his fish, and left him half dead, and warned all Indians to keep off of all that old ground -

I have notified the Commissioner Hon T. J. Morgan, thereof, and the District Attorney Winston also - I hope you will let John Simpson or some one or two Responsible Indians go there and survey, &c.
