CASCADES TO THE PACIFIC



Return via Stevens Pass Highway, (stops en route), to Seattle, Saturday, May 1, about 7 P.M.

Places of special interest to be shown throughout this region, include: Mountains, Lakes, Rivers, Islands with their geography and comment; Hydro-electric projects, Historical landmarks, Museums, Industrial and Business centers, Parades, National Parks, State Capitol - State Parks, Floating Bridges, Ocean views, Outdoor celebrations, Rhododendron lands, Proposed Highway, Bridge, and Canal Locations, and many others designed for progress.

It is recalled: On June 2 - July 10, 1947, the Puget Sounders, Inc., voted continued support for speedy construction of a Network of Bridges and connecting highways, centering in a 10,000 square mile scenic area - (Puget Sound - Olympic Peninsula). After studying highway finances, the Association then launched a campaign to inform the public regarding the true situation on highway development possibilities. Then, on October 6, 1947, at a meeting in Seattle, the members voted for an aggressive campaign to "Bond the State to build roads." Again, on February 1, 1949, while sponsoring an All-Day PUGET SOUND DEVELOPMENT CONGRESS, in the Olympic Hotel, with many organizations represented, the Congress voted indorsement and support for 20 State projects, the first of these being: 1. Modernization and expansion of the Washington State Highway System; 2. A Network of Bridges, connecting highways, and ferries for Puget Sound; 3. Pacific Ocean scenic drives - Raymond to Tokeland, Taholah to Queets, and the Neah Bay, Cape Flattery Region.

Later, it was noted: When funds became available, other projects were given preference, due perhaps to insufficient local Legislative strength, organization know-how, and unanimity.
