Thank you for your alertness in notifying me one of the copies of Strangers on the Land, sent you, was not received. Quite a number, comparatively went out, and with accompanying letters in most cases, I've ~~had~~ had a few instances matching yours, one involved the return of an empty (torn open) envelope.

Hope you enjoy Strangers, and will be looking forward to your seasoned and experienced comments. The Yakimas, I am sure, will be grateful.

The Washington State Legislature, after much maneuvering, vote trading etc., has just passed a bill placing Indians of the state of Washington under compulsory civil and criminal jurisdiction in eight fields, and with NO assurance of like services. The results will be quite interesting. The bill has not yet been signed by the governor.

Dear librarian:

The Yakima Tribal office has sent me your card of March 13, noting that three copies of "Strangers on the Land" have not been received.

Three replacement copies are enclosed.

Because the Tribal Office was swamped with work regarding the legislative session etc., I assisted in dispensing with copies of the tribal publication by withdrawing copies, sending out the promotion circulars etc.

When orders came in I mailed out books and turned the vouchers over to the Tribal Office, for proper signature. When checks came through, I checked them off my records.

My ledger records shows your letter of Feb. 13 to the tribe, the checking out by mail of the three books and turning over voucher to agency.

Should the books show up, you may return them and it will be appreciated. I am sorry this happened because things have run very smoothly in filling many orders.

I do note the Tacoma Public Library, (Tacoma 2) submitted an order (No 16185) for three copies on March 19 (date I received the order) and it was filled on the same date. It is possible there was a mail mixup.

However the main thing is you obtain the books for your order, voucher etc. The tribal office has certainly handled matters efficiently and I endeavored to do the same, because it was somewhat unusual for them to undertake such an ambitious publication, and the desire was only to get the price of publishing back (\$1.35 per unit) I believe is evidence of that. I hope you will forgive any oversight.

Dear Librarian:

I am writing relative to a possible mail mixup I will endeavor to explain. In case there has been a mixup you can inform me and deal accordingly. If not, please ignore this letter, since I realize how valuable the time of a librarian is.

Because the Yakima Tribal Office has been swamped, I assisted in promoting and sending out orders for "Strangers on the Land."

This was done by withdrawing books and mailing them. The tribal office processed vouchers. When payment was made I checked off my list.

My records show a voucher was cleared to the Yakima Tribal Office Feb. 19 and three copies, "Strangers", were mailed to the Tacoma Public Library, Tacoma 2, in compliance with Order No. 16185 on the same date. I trust you have received these.

Now, however, the tribal office mail brings me a card from the Pierce County Library, 201 St. Helens Ave., Tacoma 3, noting that three copies vouchered on Feb. 13 and mailed on the same date have not been received by that office. Replacement copies are being taken care of, of course.

I am wondering, however, if my address records are wrong, possibly, or if it is possible your library received both orders. Each order was for the same, three copies of "Strangers", unit value \$1.35 for \$2.25 single item or total of \$4.05.

I would appreciate it if you would see if this might, by chance, be the case. Return mailing charges of course will be refunded at once. And if by chance your order has not been received I would appreciate knowing so.

The tribal office has been very efficient in handling what phase of their publication project they are responsible for, and I wish to be the same. (As explained, books are withdrawn to be mailed and I wish my dealings with the tribal officials to be strictly accountable for). So far we have functioned splendidly.
