A postoffice will be established at Mason's, 5 miles wast of Zillah, for which Mrs. Melinda Mason is endorsed for postmistress: and another office at Outlock, 7 miles further east, for which Mr. Ide is the applicant--Yakima Herald, Jan. 13, 1897.

Col. A.C. Walker was up from Eillah fo several days during hahe past week and states that their Fourth of July celebration promises to be on a much larger scale than first indicated.

It will be been only celebration in the lower half of the county and a great gathering of people is anticipated. Hon Miles Cannon, Sunnyside, is to deliver the address. A brass band has been engaged for the entire day and there will be two public balls in the evening. Yakim Herald, June 27, 1897.

The Land Commissioner, Bridges and Assistant Attorney eneral Vance were in North Yakima on Tuesday for the purpose of hiving ahearing to the parties interested in school land contracts which were declared forfeited some time ago.

The land in question embraces the townsite of Zillah; and as a result of the conference, an amicable adjustment of the trouble is expected-Yakima Herald, Feb. 24, 1898.

The board of state land commissioners has ordered sold fifty-seven lots of the townsite of Zillah. These lots are located on section 36, township ll, north, range 20 east.

The sale will be conducted by Auditor Flint, as advertised in another column--Yakima Herald, August 11, 1898.

The Townsite company has donated two acres to the public school which is being enclosed by a neat fence and in time will be seeded and set out to shade trees, when it will be as beautiful a school yard as one could wish to see. The money for improving the grounds was raised by subscription circulated by Mrs. Laird-The Yakima Republic, August 18, 1899.

The cemetery association has bought three acres of ground west of town on a beautiful knoll. he ground is cleared and will soon be fenced; then people can afford to die.

The town of Zillah is growing quite rapidly. Fox Bros . have enlarged their store room; Mr. Lawrence, a newcomer has built a storeboom and dwelling comb ned and has opened a stock of hardware; the Stevens boys have built a nice dwelling in which their mother resides; Mr. Alsberry also has erected a comfortable hoe on the hill; Mr. Smith has put on an addition to his butcher s op and will live in it; Mr. Peterson the mail carrier has put up a new house on Main street. The saloon has been moved two blocks east and opened to the public. The Woodmen have erected a large new hall.

Walter Granger of Zillah-You ask me how Zillah got its name. I see you are not well posted on scripture; but I ll not argue with you on that point.

Lillah was named in honor of the daughter of T.E. Oakes, once president of the Northern Pacific railway. After completing part of the Sunnyside canal in 1893 President Oakes, with his daughter, Miss Lillah, came to the valley on a tour of inspection. The took them over part of the route and when we came to the place where Lillah now stands I told him that there we would lay out a town and maintain our offices.

He asked me what I would call the new town. I had selected no name yet and was in a quandry as to how to answer him. The thought occured to me to name the place in honor of his daughter, who was standing near y by. I replied that I would call it Zillah. This pleased him and the young lady, too, and that is how Zillah got its name--Yakima Terald, April 15, 1902.

Zillah has begun already to reap the benefit of the fact that the town is at last on the direct line of a railword.

Itis announced tha a once citizen of that famous fruit section will establish a bank to e a national bank and to be called the First National bank of Zillah.

It is declared also that the town will also have a newspaper weekly at first, which will soon make its initial appearance.

A further indication of the effect of the railway will have on a town is that the Morgan lumier company is preparing to establish a lumber yard there. The company now has a yard at Toppenish and to facilitate development will at once move some of the stock over from the reservation capital—The Yaki a Herald, May 19, 1909.

There was incorporated at Z<sub>1</sub>llah Tuesday the First National bank which is absolutely a Z<sub>1</sub>llah undertaking and is one of the signs of the new growth which follows upon the fact that a railroad or two or three have decided to run through that section of the Yakima valley.

The capital stock of te bank is \$25,000 and ther are \$1 stock-holders.

Following the formal business of the incorporation the formal business of the incorporation there was a social hour at which te nature of a bank birthday was celebrated -- The Yakima Herald, Oct. 20, 1909.
