POTATOES -- FIFTY LEADING COUNTIES IN THE UNITED STATES, BASED ON ACREAGE

Aroostook County, Maine, was the leading county not only in acreage of potatoes harvested, representing 4.5 percent of the total potato acreage in the United States, but also in production, and value, according to an announcement of the Bureau of the Census. This release gives the 50 leading potato counties in the United States (Census of 1930), ranked according to acreage harvested for sale and for home use. Clay County, Minn., was second, followed by Suffolk County, N. Y., Accomac and Northampton Counties, Va.

The potato crop represented 53.3 percent of the value of all vegetables harvested, excluding those grown under glass and in farm gardens.

ASPARAGUS -- FIFTY LEADING COUNTIES IN THE UNITED STATES, BASED ON ACREAGE

Sacramento County, California, was the leading county in acreage of asparagus harvested in the United States, and in the value of the crop as well, according to an announcement of the Bureau of the Census. This release gives the 50 leading asparagus counties in the United States (Census of 1930), ranked according to acreage harvested, and shows the rank of these counties by value of the crop. Three other California counties (Solano, San Joaquin, and Contra Costa) followed Sacramento in the order named.

The asparagus crop represented 5 percent of the value of all vegetables harvested for sale, excluding potatoes, sweetpotatoes, and vegetables grown under glass.

CANTALOUPE AND MUSKMELONS -- FIFTY LEADING COUNTIES IN THE UNITED STATES

Imperial County, California, with nearly one-fourth of the acreage of cantaloupes and muskmelons harvested in the United States, representing about 45 percent of the value, was the leading county, according to an announcement of the Bureau of the Census. The release gives the 50 leading counties in the United States (Census of 1930) ranked according to acreage harvested; also the rank of these counties according to the value of the product. Maricopa County, Ariz., was second, followed by Stanislaus County, Calif., Otero and Crowley Counties, Colo.

The value of this crop represented 5.9 percent of all vegetables harvested for sale, excluding potatoes, sweetpotatoes, and vegetables grown under glass.

ALL VEGETABLES -- SEVENTY LEADING COUNTIES IN THE UNITED STATES, BASED ON VALUE

Vegetables represent a very essential part of the farmer's income and a large portion of the food cost of the United States, according to an announcement released by the Bureau of the Census today. The value of all vegetables, at the census of 1930, amounted to over a billion dollars, of which vegetables grown in the farm garden represented \$226,000,000; Irish potatoes, about \$415,000,000; and sweetpotatoes, almost \$68,000,000.

Aroostook County, Maine, ranked first in the list of 70 leading counties in the United States, principally on account of the value of Irish potatoes. Imperial County, Calif., was second, due to the production of early vegetables. Los Angeles, Calif., was third, and Accomac County, Va., fourth.

In this list of leading counties, 26 States are represented, extending from Florida to Texas, and from Maine to Washington. Thirty-six of the counties owe their position principally to the production of Irish potatoes, and thirty-four to vegetables harvested for sale.

Complete statistics for vegetables and all other crops are available for distribution at the Bureau of the Census.

ALL FRUITS AND NUTS

The Bureau of the Census announces the 65 counties, in the United States, leading in the value of all fruits and nuts (Census of 1930). These counties were located in 15 States, one or more in each geographic division, except the West North Central and the East South Central Divisions. California had 28 counties, Florida 8, New York and Washington, 6 each, and Oregon and Virginia, 3 each. The rank of 34 counties was principally due to orchard fruits, 17 to subtropical fruits, 10 to grapes, 3 to small fruits, and 1 to nuts.

California had the six leading counties. Los Angeles County led with 6.9 percent of the value of all fruits and nuts followed by Orange, San Bernardino, Tulare, Fresno, and Ventura.

The value of fruits and nuts represented 8.1 percent of the value of all crops, exclusive of forest, nursery, and greenhouse products.

The three leading counties were in California --Sutter, Fresno, and Stanislaus, respectively, followed by Berrien, Mich. Georgia, with Upson County in fifth place, had 11 of the 50 counties.

In view of coming crops, the number of young trees is very important, particularly so in Berrien County, Mich., Tulare County, Calif., and Niagara County, N.Y.

The value of the peach crop represented 8.4 percent of the value of all fruits and nuts harvested.

CHERRIES -- FIFTY LEADING COUNTIES IN THE UNITED STATES

Door County, Wisconsin, was the leading cherry county in the United States according to an announcement of the Bureau of the Census giving the 50 leading counties based on the number of trees of bearing age in 1930.

This is in the nature of a surprise to many as most of the cherry counties are on the opposite side of the lake in Michigan, or along the shores of Lake Erie and Lake Ontario in New York, and on the Pacific Coast. Colorado has a small but rather important area. Of the States, California had 12 counties in the list; Michigan, 10; New York and Oregon, 7 each; Washington, 5; and Colorado, 3.

The value of cherries represented 2.6 percent of the value of all fruits and nuts.

PLUMS AND PRUNES -- FIFTY LEADING COUNTIES IN THE UNITED STATES

Santa Clara County, California, was the leading county in the United States (Census of 1930) based on the number of plum trees of bearing age of all varieties including prunes, according to an announcement of the Bureau of the Census today. This county, with 18.1 percent of the trees of bearing age, harvested 21.5 percent of the total production, which represented 19 percent of the value of the plums and prunes. All counties except six (Niagara, N.Y., Bexar, Tex., and Ada, Canyon, Gem, and Payette, Idaho) were located in California, Oregon, and Washington. The value of the plums (and prunes) harvested represented 2.8 percent of the value of all fruits and nuts.

THE PACIFIC STATESCENSUS REPORTS ON SIZE OF CHICKEN FLOCKS

A special report was issued today by Director William L. Austin of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, showing the significance of the size of operations in an analysis of poultry statistics in California, Washington, and Oregon. This study was made possible through the cooperation of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, United States Department of Agriculture. It presents by size of flock, the number of chickens on hand, chicken egg production, and number of chickens raised as shown in the 1935 Farm Census with comparative figures from the 1930 Census.

DECLINE IN LARGE OPERATIONS

Of particular interest is the increased number of small flocks and the general tendency toward a reduction in size of the larger flocks. In the three States combined, farms reporting less than 50 chickens on hand increased 23.7 percent during the five-year interval while those reporting 50 to 99 increased 9.0 percent and those reporting 100 to 199 increased only 6.5 percent. Farms reporting over 200 chickens on hand showed a decline, the percent reduction in which became proportionately greater as the size of the operations increased.

Flocks of 1,000 and over declined nearly one-fourth while those of 2,500 and over decreased almost one-third. Egg production and chickens raised declined in approximately corresponding amounts. Individually, California and Washington had fewer large flocks while Oregon showed a small gain. The number of flocks of 1,000 chickens and over in California fell from 4,494 to 3,219, the number in Washington declined from 965 to 823, and in Oregon increased from 174 to 189. In flocks of 2,500 and over, California and Washington showed declines, California from 914 to 592 and Washington from 99 to 80, while Oregon showed an increase from 14 to 19.

Special tabulations similar to this may be made by the Census for poultry associations or other interests paying for the cost of such tabulations.

FARM CENSUS SHOWS 41,000 ACRES OF VEGETABLES IN WASHINGTON

Vegetables harvested for sale totaled 41,491 acres in Washington, in 1934, according to a special report of the 1935 Federal Farm Census released today by Director William L. Austin of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce. This total acreage of market vegetables included 913 acres of snap or string beans reported on 1,286 farms and ranches, 2,284 acres of cabbages reported on 1,371 farms and ranches, 3,422 acres of sweet corn reported on 2,860 farms and ranches, 2,686 acres of tomatoes reported on 1,842 farms and ranches, 1,778 acres of watermelons reported on 595 farms and ranches, and 30,408 acres of all other vegetables (excluding Irish and sweet potatoes) reported on 11,783 farms and ranches. King, Yakima, and Spokane were the three leading counties in the State in the acreage of vegetables harvested for sale, having over 45 percent of the total acreage in the State. In 1929, vegetables harvested for sale totaled 23,856 acres, of which 1,046 acres were snap or string beans, 2,017 acres cabbages, 2,396 acres sweet corn, 1,592 acres tomatoes, and 884 acres watermelons.

Vegetables grown for use on the farms and ranches were valued at \$2,259,043 in 1934, and were reported on 57,833, or 68.5 percent of all the farms and ranches in the State.

STATE OF WASHINGTONFARM CENSUS REPORTS 186,000,000 GALLONS OF MILK PRODUCED IN THE STATE OF WASHINGTON

The production of milk on farms and ranches in the State of Washington totaled 186,906,784 gallons in 1934, according to a special report of the 1935 Federal Farm Census released today by Director William L. Austin of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce. The number of cows milked in the State increased from 287,575 in 1929 to 311,509 in 1934, or an increase of 16.4 percent. Whatcom, King, and Snohomish were the three leading counties in the State in the production of milk and in the number of cows milked.

Butter churned on farms and ranches amounted to 5,663,913 pounds in 1934, or an increase of 77.2 percent over that of 1929. Butter was reported churned on 45.3 percent of all the farms and ranches in the State in 1934, as compared with 32.2 percent in 1929.

This is the third of State series of releases presenting figures by counties on cows milked, milk production, and butter churned on farms. Copies of this and releases for other States may be obtained by writing the Bureau of the Census, Washington, D. C.

CHICKENS AND TURKEYS ON FARMS AND RANCHES

Director William L. Austin of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, issued a special report of the 1935 Federal Farm Census today showing the importance of chickens and turkeys in Washington. Chickens over 3 months old numbered 5,881,583 on January 1, 1935 and were reported on 63,231, or 74.9 percent of all the farms and ranches in the State. During the calendar year 1934, the production of chicken eggs amounted to 56,535,398 dozens and the number of chickens raised was 7,704,282. Whatcom County ranked first, King County second, Snohomish County third, and Pierce County fourth in the number of chickens on hand, the production of chicken eggs, and the number of chickens raised.

Turkeys over 3 months of age on January 1, 1935 totaled 53,842 and were reported on 5,263, or 6.2 percent of all the farms and ranches in the State. Yakima County with 12,886 ranked first, Benton County with 5,784 ranked second and Clark County with 2,700 ranked third in the number of turkeys.

STATE OF WASHINGTON47,000 PERSONS MIGRATE TO FARMS AND RANCHES IN WASHINGTON

Of the 335,840 persons living on farms and ranches on January 1, 1935 in Washington, 47,818, or 14.2 percent, lived in nonfarm residences five years earlier, according to a special report of the 1935 Federal Farm Census released today by Director William L. Austin of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce. A large proportion of the movement to farms and ranches occurred in the counties in the Puget Sound area. Counties in which over 1,000 of the persons on farms and ranches lived in nonfarm residences five years earlier were Chelan, Clark, Cowlitz, Grays Harbor, King, Kitsap, Lewis, Okanogan, Pierce, Skagit, Snohomish, Spokane, Stevens, Thurston, Whatcom, Whitman, and Yakima.

The State's farm and ranch population of 335,840 persons on January 1, 1935 represented an increase of 10.3 percent over that of April 1, 1930 and included 326,804 white persons and 9,036 colored persons (Negroes, Indians, Chinese, Japanese, and other nonwhite races).

Dwellings on farms and ranches totaled 101,887, of which 92,972 were occupied and 8,915 were unoccupied on January 1, 1935.

OVER TWO-FIFTHS OF WASHINGTON'S FARMERS AND RANCHERS REPORT PART-TIME FARMING

Part-time work in 1934 for pay, or income, at jobs not connected with their farms and ranches was reported by 35,950, or 42.6 percent of all the farm and ranch operators in Washington, according to a special report of the 1935 Federal Farm Census released today by Director William L. Austin of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce. Days worked off the farm or ranch for pay, or income, totaled 4,424,885 or an average of 123 days per operator reporting. A classification of the principal occupations during the time gainfully employed off the farm as either agricultural or nonagricultural indicated that five times as many operators reported work in nonagricultural as in agricultural pursuits. More than one-half the farm and ranch operators in the counties of Cowlitz, Ferry, Grays Harbor, Jefferson, Mason, Pacific, Pend Oreille, Skamania, Thurston, and Wahkiakum reported work for pay, or income, in 1934 off the farm.

Persons working on farms and ranches the equivalent of two or more days (exclusive of housework) during the first week of January 1935 totaled 127,478, of which 109,910 were family workers and 17,568 were hired help. Family workers include the farm or ranch operator and members of his family working without wages.
