I am wondering if you would wish any of these, a few for your own inspection, or, Caxtons would be willing to print 1,000 or over with Dawson's name, address eto.

I would appreciate a note in this regard if you happen to be interested.

In any respect it will be the prelude to consideration of a small sample order for spring delivery (when you see the circular) and this will help give an idea as to the number to be published.

I have spent over five years research on it including much field work and think it will stand up as a good item. The enclosed dip will give you an idea of some of the "startling developments.

The story concerns the few survivors of Smowhala's band of Dreamers (See Mooney 14th Annual Report Pt. II) My source is the nephew of mowhala. Dr. F.W. Hodge wrote the introduction.

My writing in the Treaty entennial wraps item of course was rushed, as explained. But you may find it intresting.
