Norman Whitney is a former professor of English Literature at Syracuse University and has served both as a member of the Board of Directors of AFSC and as National Peace Education Secretary. He was a member of the working party which produced the well-known AFSC pamphlet SPEAK TRUTH TO POWER. In 1952 he represented the Religious Society of Friends at the Friends World Conference which was held in Oxford, England. Norman Whitney has visited Quaker and Doukhobor settlements in various parts of the world, and in 1960 he attended the Ecumenical Council of the Protestant Churches in Czechoslovakia.
