Washington State Delegates of the National Association of Blackfeet Indians RECENTLY RETURNED FROM AN OFFICIAL MEETING WITH THEIR OFFICIALLY RECOGNIZED GOVERNING BODY, THE BLACKFEET TRIBL BUSNESS COUNCIL, BROWNING, MONTANA. THOSE MAKING THE TRIP AND ATTENDING THE MEETING INCLUDED THE NATIONAL CHAIR-MAN. L. D. BILLEDEAUX. SENIOR VICE CHAIRMAN. ALFRED N. GOSS. MRS. BEN PAISLEY. AND MRS. LILY GLADSTONE. SEATTLE. AND JUNIOR VICE CHAIRMAN L. C. NEWEREAST OF TACOMA. THEY WILL GIVE THEIR OFFICIAL REPORT TO THE GENERAL MEMBERSHIP AT THEIR NEXT REGULARLY SKHEDULED MEETING TO BE HELD SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 10, 1967. AT 1:00 pm. AT THE LT. JAMES M. EAGLESON VFW POST HALL. 908 TWELFTH AVENUE. SEATTLE. WASHINGTON. WHILE THE MEETING IS OPEN TO THE PUBLICE. MEMBERS OF THE BLACKFEET TRIBE ARE PARTICULARLY URGED TO ATTEND. OF PRIMARY IMPORTANCE WILL BE THE OFFICIAL REACTION AS TO THE DISTRIBUTION OF THE JUDGMENT AWARD WHICH WAS AWARDED TO THE BLACKFEET TRIBE IN AMOUNT OF ELEVEN MILLION DOLLARS ON MARCH 31, 1967, BY THE US INDIAN CLAIMS COMMISSION IN WASHINGTON, D. C.

their regular menthly meeting dates. Plans are underway for a dinner meeting on Sunday,


April 21, 1968, at which time the U. S. Bureau of Indian Affairs Agency Superintendent

MEMBERS OF THE BLACKFEET TRIBE OF THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF BLACKFEET INDIANS ASSEMBLED AT THEIR HEADQUARTERS IN THE CARPENTERS UNION BUILDING, 231 BURNETT NORTH, MENTON, WASHINGT FOR THE ANNUAL ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

THEY MANIMOUSLY RELECTED THEIR CHAIRMAN FOR THE SECOND CONSECUTIVE YEAR, LINCOLN D.
BILLEDEAUX OF RENTON, WASHINGTON. CHAIRMAN BILLEDEAUX HAS LONG BEEN CONNECTED WITH
INDIAN AFFAIRS AND UNTIL ILL HEALTE RECERTLY FORCED HIM INTO SEMI-RETIREMENT WORK FROM
THE U. S. BUREAU OF INDIAN AFFAIRS WHERE HE SERVED FOR TEN YEARS, HAS BEEN ACTIVE IN
TRIBAL AFFAIRS OF AMERICAN INDIANS IN THE UNITED STATES. HE IS AN OVERSEAS VETERAN OF
WORLD WAR II AND GRADUATED FROM BROWNING HIGH SCHOOL, BROWNING, MONTANA. LATER HE ATTENDED
NORTHERN MONTANA COLLEGE AT HAVRE, MONTANA, SEATTLE UNIVERSITY, SEATTLE, WASHINGTON, AND
WESTERN RESERVE UNIVERSITY, CLEVELAND, OHIO. PRIOR TO HIS EMPLOYMENT WITH THE U. S. BUREAU
OF INDIAN AFFAIRS HE SERVED AS VETERANS EMPLOYMENT REPRESENTATIVE OF THE WASHINGTON STATE
EMPLOYMENT SECURITY DEPARTMENT IN RENTON AND TACOMA, WASHINGTON, FOR NEARLY FIFTEEN YEARS.
OTHER OFFICERS WHO WILL SERVE WITH HIM FOR 1968-69, ARE HERB L. BARNES, SEATTLE, AND L. C.
"CHUCK" NEWBREAST, TACOMA. JUNIOR VICE CHAIRMEN ELECTED ARE MRS. FORREST D. ROHOLT, SPOKAN
GEORGE CALF ROBE SR., YARIMA, ROBERT E. BARLOW, EVERETT, RONALD E. CROSS GURS AND CHESTER
E. GLADSTONE, BOTH OF SEATTLE, WASHINGTON. DARRELL L. HORMAN, SEATTLE, WAS ELECTED
TREASURER.

THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF THE BLACKFEET INDIANS WILL ESTABLISH A TEMPORARY HEADQUARTERS ON THE BLACKFEET INDIAN RESERVATION AT BROWNING, MONTANA, IN THE HAGERTY HOTEL TO ENABLE THEM TO PARTICIPATE IN THE IMPORTANT COMING ELECTION OF TRIBAL COUNCIL MEMBERS TO BE HELD THERE ON JUNE 18, 1968. SEVERAL HUNDRED NON-RESERVATION RESIDENTS OF THE BLACKFEET TRIBE ARE EXPECTED TO RETURN TO THEIR RESERVATION TO VOTE ON IMPORTANT ISSUES AT THIS VITAL ELECTION, SINCE THEY ARE UNABLE BY THE TRIBAL CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS TO VOTE BY ABSENTED BALLOT.

THROUGH THE COMBINED EFFORTS OF THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF BLACKFEET INDIANS AND THEIR FELLOW TRIBESMEN RESIDING ON THE BLACKFEET INDIAN RESERVATION IN MONTANA, THEY WERE NON ABLE TO UNSEAT SIX TRIBAL COUNCILMEN OF THEIR GOVERNING BODY, THE BLACKFEET TRIBAL BUS* INESS COUNCIL, WHICH IS A MAJORITY OUT OF NINE, IN A RECENT ELECTION HELD ON JUNE 18TH IT WAS REPORTED BY NABI CHAIRMAN LINCOIN D. BILLEDEAUX ON HIS RETURN FROM A FIVE WEEK SOJOURN ON THE RESERVATION. SOME OF THE DEFEATED COUNCILMEN HAD SERVED SEVERAL TERMS AND ONE HAD SERVED FOR THIRTY-TWO YEARS. NEARLY THREE HUNDRED OFF RESERVATION RESIDENTS OF THE BLACKFEET TRIBE RETURNED TO THEIR MONTANARY RESERVATION TO PARTICIPATE IN THE ELECTION, WITH THE MAJORITY OF THESE COMING FROM WASHINGTON, IDAHO AND OREGON.

BILLEDEAUX BELIEVES THAT NEW HOPES FOR A BUSINESS LIKE ADMINISTRATION AND HANDLING OF TRIBAL FINANCES AND AFFAIRS APPEAR ON THE HORIZON WITH THE ELECTION OF A TWO THIRDS MAJORITY TO THEIR BUSINESS COUNCIL. EXCITEMENT RAN HIGH WHEN AN NABI ENDORSED CANDIDATE, DEFEATED THE INCUMBENT TRIBAL SECRETARY IN A VOTE RECOUNT BY FOUR VOTES.

MRS. MARTINA ARNOUX BECAME THE THIRD LADY TO BE ELECTED TO SERVE ON THE TRIBAL COUNCIL IN ITS TO YEAR HISTORY AND OVERCOME GREAT ODDS SINCE HISTORICALLY ACCORDING TO THE BLACKFEET, WOMEN'S PLACE IS IN THE BACKGROUND.
