PLATFORM OF YAKIMA COUNTY DEMOCRATIC VONVENTION adopted at Granger,
May 17, 1950

### 1. Preamble

We, the representatives of the Democratic party of Yakima county, are duly assembled in convention at a time which may prove critical to the history of civilization. We are distinctly aware of the fact that social and economic justice for all is a necessary condition to the peace of nations and to the happiness of mankind. The Democratic party must main tain a progressive leadership in foreign policy. It must participate in so shaping the affa irs of the nation that the world shall not be divided between two warring camps of Communsism and reaction, but shall beable to choose the only hopeful alternative of social and economic democracy.

RESOLUTIONS

We believe that President Harry S. Truman is honest and sincere in fulfilling the duties of his high office; we believe in his fundamental liberalism in domestic affairs; we believe in the fact that his leadership will lead the Democratic party to victory in 1950

We commend the efficient service of Lt. Gov. Vic Meyers; Sec. of State, Earl Coe; Treasurer, Tom Meyers; Auditor Cliff Yell; Attorney General Smith Troy; Insurance Commissioner, William Sullivan; and La nd Commissioner Jack Taylor.

7. FARM The

The Democratic Party since the time of Thomas Jefferson, has recognized the importance of a prosperous, locally determined agricultural program for family sized farms.

We recommend that the US Dept. of Africulture do all in its power under the law to aid and assist in the establishment of locally controlled Marketing Agreements for all soft fruits, apple and other commodities.

We favor National and State lagislation designed to furtherconsumer and producers cooperatives as a means of achieving a greater measure of economic equality and democracy within a free enterprise system.

We strongly favor maintaining the Federal Soil Conservation Service as an "action" agency, with policy details determined at the county level by elected farmer supervisors. We endorse the effective work the agency has done in giving farmers technical and engineering assistance in carrying out conservation practices

The tax status of farm cooperatives must be preserved against
Republican attempts to impose double taxa tion on cooperative income both before and a fter it is distributed to cooperative members.

We believe the Congress and Sta te legislature should continue to promote farm co-operatives and farm-owned co-op banks as a means of retaining economic freedom on family sized farms.

We strongly favor the establishment of a state office for the Farmers

H ome Administration, so that this agency can be locally administered by

local p eople who are cognizant of the problems of the State of Wash9igton.

We strongly favor liberal appropriations to the Farmers Home Administration in order that this agency can secure credit for the Farmers of Yakima county who have suffered two disastrous crop years.

We favor adequate appropriations for the maintena nce of the Market News Survice so that the farmers and monsumers may know at a 11 times what a fair market value is for farm products grown in this state.

We favor the calling together of all farm organiza tions so that they

ma y formulate their own progra m on a National Scale.

EDUCATION

We recognize that good education of our young people, is a cornerstone of our democracy, is dependent upon adequate salaries for our teachers and an a dequate school housing program. We wholeheartedly support necessary amendments to our state laws to achieve these aims.

We recognize that the transportation of children to and from school is a matter of vital concern to all. We recommend that the necessary amendment and revision of our laws be made which will permit children, attending other than the public schools, to use the school transportation facilities to that public school which the child is entitled to attend.

At present time our freedom is threatened from two sources:

First, by the spread of the Communist system from abroad; and Second, from a reactionary element in America, which under the guise of fighting Communism, is smearing all liberal and forward looking people as Communist and are trying to reestablish the tactics used in the Inquisition of 400 years ago, by using irresponsible charges defaming the characters of innocent people who may hold progressive views.

We especially deplore the systematic attacks on educational institutions and instructors, as the first step that might lead to thought control in our educational system. The irresponsia ble tactics of the Ca nwells, the McCarthys and the Hickenloop ers, under the sponsorship of the Republican party, are the first step in the Suppression of Academic Freedom.

111 LABOR

The Democra tic party has sponsored the cause of labor so that the workers of the nations have achieved the nearest to a proper standard of living yet attained in any country the world. We will continue to use every effort to promote the ability of the American workers to live

democra tica lly without enslavement to any employer or group of employers.

Under the guise of stting up fair labor practices, the Taft H artley a ct was craftily devised to attempt to destroy labor unions and require workers to barga in individually in a competitive labor market against the over powering wealth and combination of industry.

We urge Congress to repeal the Taft-H a rtley act and to re-enact the Wagner act, thus restoring to labor the equality of bargaining achieved under Franklin D. Rosevelt.

#### V. POWER

Low cost electric power is the key to the development of industry, agriculture, agricultura 1 markets, and the full employment of Labbr in Self Liquidative in Ya kima county. We fa vor the esta blishment of a 7 Columbia Va lley admin istration and the completion of the Grand Coulee-Bonneville generating and transmission system, with the construction of Priest Rapids, McNa ry, Chief Joseph and other a dditional dams on the Columbia River and its tributaries. We oppose any increase in wholesale power rates such as rep eatedly proposed in Congress by Republican leaders.

We strongly object to any attempt to whittle away the national p olicy of first p reference to public power agencies as to Grand Coulee-Bonne-ville Power.

## VI. VETERANS AID

We believe that both our federa 1 and our state governments should continue and exp and every form of veterans aid directed toward helping him help himself, and directed toward offsetting the loss which every man who served his country in war suffered a s a result of such service.

We believe that the program of aid to disabled veterans should be strengthened and exp anded with special attention to the individual p roblems of each disabled veteran.

### PUBLIC SERVICE UTILITIES

We deplore the recent action of the Washington Public Service Commission for granting an unwarranted rate increase in telep hone service beween Selah and Yakima.

We censure the recent action of the Public Service Commission in ordering the abandonment of the Naches Railroad depot, a depot, which in the past has handled approximately 1 and one-half million dollars in annula freight revenues. This action will cost the shippers and consumers of Na ches untold thousands of dollars for the benefit of a favored few.

### FREIGHT RATES

Fa ir and reasonable freight rates are essential to the welfare of Yakima county, which buys more miles of transportation per capita than any other county in America. The failure of federal regulatory bodies to extend to this area thereduction in class rates given in the Midwest and South, and the p yramiding of long haul rates by repeated p ercentage increases is tending to drive the industries of this state from the national markets and increase the price which our citizens pay for the necessities of life. We urge the State and Federal Government through their regulatory agencies, to take effective action to bring the class rate structure of the Pa cific Northwest into conformity with other sections and to limit further increases of long haul rates.

#### HIGHWAYS

We advocate theat the funds be appropriated to finish the White Pa ss Highway as a first class highway.

#### STATE PARKS

We prop ose to develop all of our State Parks already acquired and to and develop as state parks other beaches, scenic and historical sites, and poin ts of interest, and other recreational areas and facilities, and to provide a dequate access highways to make them readily accessible.

We prop ose that Fort Simcoe be made a state p ark and that immediate a nd adequate steps be taken to preserve and magintain this pioneer mon-

DOMESTIC

We commend President Truman for his courageous veto of/vicious Kerr Natural Gas Bill, a piece of special interest legislation which would have mulcted the consumer for the benefit of a favored few.

DOMESTIC

CIVAL RIGHTS

The civil rights guaranteed to all Americans by our Constitution have been, and continue to be, abridged in many ways and in may parts of the nation.

Concern over distruurbed world condidtions should never divert the people of the US from ever watchful attention to their national economy and well being, and above all, to the preservation of their democratic ideals.

The Rep ublican Pa rty has conspicusously failed, at the local, state and national levels to pay more than lip service to the requirements of p rotection of our racial and religious minorities laid down in our Constitution.

Such failure renders the nation ineffective and invites merited condemnation by those countries which rationalize their own discrimination and mistreatment of minority groups.

# NATION AL DEFENSE

As long as there is world unrest, we favor a program of entirely adequate Na tional Defense and recommend that our army, navy and a ir force be maintained at the strenght to imp lement our foreign policy.

We commend President Truman for his courageous decision to further the development of the HHydrogen Bomb.

FOREIGN POLICY

We commend President Truma n for rising above partisan politics in the formulation of a non partisan foreign policy, despite the determined efforts of an obstructionist Rep ublican Isolationist Group, who would sacrifice the welfare of our nation for their own political gain.

We favor continued and vigorous efforts to support truly democratic and liberal elements in all countries by the continuation and expansion of the president's Europea n Recovery Program.

We fa vor the vigorous implementation of President Truman's Point Four, the exp ort of American Know-how and enterprise, as the surest means to comba t the chaos that conceives Communism.

We pdep lore and & censure the irresponsible tactics of McCarthyism which have brought discredit upon our diplomatic representatives and hampered their efforts to further the interests of America.

We commend President Truman for having kept us out of war in these troubled times of unrest. We firmly believe that the only alternative to President Truman's policy is WAR.
