We don't have a lot of money but we do know how to make our own way. There are juveniles in our class of people but so are there in some of the richer people. We don't think we are better than anyone else. We try to get along with everyone, for we believe in live and let live. We don't like for anyone to promise our children things and have their selves glorified in the papers and on T.V. then after their glory they don't want anything to do with the children. Life is full of disappointments as it is. Why try to disappoint someone else for anyone's personal gain? We are not a lot of uneducated people. Most of us have a pretty good education. When some one says they are going to do something to help us we think they should do it. Most of the men could handle good jobs if they had the right opportunities. We are a working class of people. But we try also to hold our heads up. For this is important to us. We don't like to be used or misjudged.

I think this Auto Mechanic's school is real good. It can help a guy get a chance to learn a trade so he can get a better job. My wife, she's going to this cooking school and sewing school, and she's learning a lot. We get something new every night we never had before. She's making a lot of clothes for the kids which aught to help us in saving money when we ain't got the money really to spend. She likes it and I'm glad. It helps her and helps out on our budget too. The kids like the Head Start Program, especially Karen; you can't keep her away. Iona feels the same way.

WOMEN'S CORNER

Chicken Tamale Pie - 6 servings
Heat oven to 350 (medium heat).
Put into baking pan and cook until
brown: † cup butter or margarine

brown: 1 cup butter or margarine
1 onion chopped
2 cups left-over chicken or
turkey (remove bones)
Add 3 cups chicken broth or
left-over gravy

Put into a bowl and mix well:

1 cup cornmeal

1 cup milk

2 eggs

l teaspoon baking powder teaspoon salt

Pour over chicken mixture and bake 1 hour.

L.O.M.A. NEWS

I - Dance - "Mop and Broom A Go-Go" There will be a teenager dance Wednesday, Feb. 23rd between 7:30 and 9PM. It will be held at the camp gym. You'll work a little and dance a little. The gym needs a bit of Spring cleaning even if it's not Spring yet. II - Polio - Anyone who wants their children to have a Polio shot may do so on Monday Feb. 28th at 3:30PM at the Ahtanum Camp Library. It will not be a shot in the arm, but will be given on a sugar cube to be eaten by the child. It will be given to the children only and they must be between 6 months to 18 years old. Adults may also take it but it will be a shot in the arm. There is NO CHARGE for this. The children cannot have the sugar cube if they have taken gama globulin or have had smallpox or measles in the last 30 days. Also they must not have a lung disease, fever, loose bowels, or be sick to their stomach (vomiting).

An Okay slip will be delivered to the homes for the parents to sign if they want their children to have the sugar cube. The slips will also be available at the LOMA office in the Library.
