singles into the Top 20 pop charts and garnered garnered Grammy nominations for "Get Here" and her cover of "Don't Let the Sun Go Down On Me.

The awards will be announced Feb. 26.
Adams is nominated in the Best R&B against Mary, Maxwell's "Urban Hang Suite," Curtis Mayfield's "New World Order," Me'Shell Ndegeo-

cello's "Peace Beyond Passion" and "Words," by the Tony Rich Project.

But Adams, who lives in Kansas City with husband John Cushon, won't holding her breath. In fact, won't be don't even watch anymore," she said in a recent telephone in-terview. "At first it's so exciting, sitting next to Liza Minelli, all these Whitney Houston people you heard on the radio.

Now, "It isn't important the sense of really qualifying my talent," Adams said. "It's a politically motivated award.
