SCENE I.

SCENE I.

The desert is a lonely and barren waste, but as the light of dawn replaces the dimness, flowers awaken and begin to unfold. As the sun goes higher, the flowers join their priestess in the worship of the sun. All, that is, but one, a pale bud who stands apart, unable to open her petals to the blazing sun. The others repremand her for not conforming to their ritual. She dances a sad waltz expressing her sorrow at being different from the other flowers. The small flowers, distressed by her weeping, dance about her trying to cheer her with their antics, but to no avail. Suddenly a beautiful luna moth flutters into their midst. Blinded by the sun he staggers against the flowers, frightening them. They run and hide closing their petals, all but the pale bud, who beckons him to rest in the shade of the plant. He tells her of the coolness of the desert nights and of the exotic night flowers, as they dance. Before the dance has quite ended he disappears. She is so entranced with her dreams of becoming a night flower that she finishes the dance alone without realizing he is gone. The other flowers return and she look around for the moth. Day fades and with a little ritual dance the flowers all go to sleep. all go to sleep.

SCENE II.

The same scene in dim light, one star is visible. The pale bud and the flowers are on the stage. She wishes on the star and dances to it. A magic bird appears and dances as the moon slowly rises. Absorbed with watching the exotic bird the pale bud (who had dropped her cloak) does not realize she has blossomed into a rare and beautiful (but short-lived) flower, until the middle of the dance when she joins the flowers and they crown her queen. By now the moon is high and the luna moth appears, this time strong and sure in his own kingdom. He kneels before the queen and they dance, the others doing the ritual dance to the moon and to romance. As he leads her to the throne she realizes that she is dying and once again she dances her sad waltz and collapses. The moth and the other flowers gently carry her away, moonlight fades and the moth takes flight. In the pale light of dawn, the desert reasserts its timelessness. timelessness.
