IN THE SERVICE OF DEMOCRACY

Important national, state and local decisions were made by the people in the general election. Candidates of all political parties participated in the debate in true democratic fashion. It is a rendition of public service of the highest degree for a citizen to present himself as a candidate, and actively take part in the promotion of good government, because it is only in this manner that issues are drawn and policies decided. All the candidates for major and minor offices deserve the highest public commendation, rather than criticism because their ideas may conflict with those who disagree with them, for only time can tell which side was right. As the immortal Franklin D. Roosevelt said, in his final speech of the 1936 Presidential campaign:

"Sometimes men wonder overmuch what they will receive for what they are giving in the service of democracy—whether it is worth the cost to share in that struggle which is a part of the business of representative government. The reward of that effort is to feel that they have been a part of great things, that they have helped to build, that they have had their share in the great battles of their generation. However large or small our part, we can all feel with Theodore Roosevelt who said many years ago:

"'It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbled, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena; whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs and comes short again and again; who knows the great enthusiasms, the great devotions, and spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumphs of high achievement; and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly; so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who know neither defeat nor victory."
