Dear Mr. Ettl:

hank you for the estimates on proposed sculpture projects which reached here today. This information was needed imediately by the board considering this type of work.

Various plans are under contemplation. And in anticipation of what the board will want to know, concerning these combination of plans is:

Vatican stone. Would this be practical in fountain xxx work, the main work or the base (it's adaptability to water in other words) and is this a determined color, achieved by mixing or a set color.

It would be helpful to obtain a small chip or two of this Vatican stone to examine the texture and anotation of colors. Match-box size is large enough.

I would want to determine, too, if this would be practical for outdoor usage; or its usability on a series of indoor figures or busts.

I am recom ending bronze for the fountain and for the 18 inch bronze figures, but there will be some advantage to variety of materials.

I presume that atican stone, for inside casting, need not be "finished", like hydrostone would be. It is possible that some finishing of casts may be necessary and - trust your studio could carry out this work if such is necessary.

My main interest, now, is to obtain more information on atican tone. It will probably be simpler to call you if there is a favorable determination made, and line up the specific questions at that time.

The material will be in the board's hands by Monday and immediate response could be expected except the board is presently deeply engaged in setting up condemnation schedules involving farm lands, accepting one contract and letting another. I am hopeful that the eastern architect has listened to my recommendations made when called into consult tion and is providing space sufficient for some real work. I shall keep you informed.

This you may recall is a matter I wrote you about four years ago and has been "inactive, until now. Sincerely Click Relander
