Dear Mr. Shelton:

Enclosed is a postal draft made out to you to pay for the cost of the insertion of an advertisement concerning the appearance in connection with Drummers and Dreamers, Oct. 16. This is for an eight inch advertisement, figuring 84 cents an inch, total price \$6.72.

We will come to Moscow direct from Spokane, where we will be through the afternoon of October 15, a Monday. We will wish to break away from Moscow a little before 5 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 16 if possible so we can go to Pullman.

I regret that I did not have a mailing list for Moscow like Spokane, Portland and other northwestern cities.

The death of the leader, pictured on the invitation, will not materially affect the tour, which will now be in a type of a memorial to him. You may have noticed news stories concerning his death in various Northwest papers.

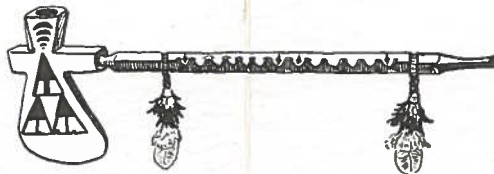
