R. H. Ives Gammell was born in Providence, Rhode Island in 1893. He graduated from Groton School in 1911 and subsequently spent two years at the School of the Boston Museum of Fine Arts.

Mr. Gammell considers himself a pupil of William Paxton, with whom he was closely associated for many years. However, he also studied under William Sergeant Kendall, Phillip L. Hale, Frank W. Benson and Charles W. Hawthorne and received criticism and advice from Joseph DeCamp and Edmund C. Tarbell. He has devoted much of his time to portraiture as well as to mural decoration. Large decorations by Mr. Gammell are in the Newark Public Library, Newark, N. J.; in the Art Museum at Toledo, Ohio; and in the home of Sumner Welles Esq. Oxon Hill, Md. A book by him. "Twilight of Painting" was published by G. P. Putnam's Sons in 1947. Mr. Gammell is a member of the Guild of Boston Artists, the Allied Artists of America, and the American Society of Mural Painters.

A. E. LARSON COLLECTION

The A. E. Larson Collection is made up largely of approximately 300 books from the Larson home library, pictures of early days in the Yakima Valley as well as of distant points visited by the Larsons, and souvenirs collected in their travels in Africa, Japan, China, South America, Mexico, Alaska, and many other places throughout the world.

The Larson Collection has been classified by Dr. Erna Gunther, anthropologist at the University of Washington. Typical examples of what may be found in the Larson exhibit follow: decorated ceremonial dagger in sheath, small lacquered dish, tall boots used in Northern China and Tibet, and bead work, statuary, and trinkets from many parts of the globe. A tapestry purchased by the Larsons in India is estimated to have a current value of \$1600.

The showing of the A. E. Iarson Collection during the month of November is very fitting because of the dedication of the new Yakima Valley Junior College building and campus on November 16. The site was presented to the College by Mr. and Mrs. Shirley D. Parker in memory of Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Iarson after whom the Museum and Gallery has been named.
