Hatton, a town in the southwestern part of dams county. The place was originally mown as "win Wells. Wen the postoffice was established in 1888 the post office depar tment asked for a now name. The superintendent of the railroad asked the postmaster, J.D. Hack tt, for a list of the patrons of $t$ he off ic $\theta$. One of the names submitted was Sutton (father of State Senator Sutton) where upon the railroad man took the first two letters of Hackett and the 要t four letters of $S_{u} t t o n$ and submitted the camposite name of Hatton which was adopted. Haven, a town on the Columbia River in the southern part of Grant county. It was named for Henry H. Haven in 1908. (F.C. Koppen of Wabluke, in names MSS Letter 110 , Meany)

Hawk Creek, a tributary of the Columbia River at Peach in the northecent: part of Lincoln county. 'L'he name was for an early settler named Hawkins (Posi master at Peach in Names MSS I $\begin{aligned} & \text { atter } 159 \text { Meany) }\end{aligned}$

Hazard, a settlement, store and at one time a postoffice in the northern part of Spokane county. 'he store was started about 1886 by R.R. Hazard and in $h$ is home the place was named (I.C. Owen of Denison in Names MSS Letter 190 Meany)

Hellgate, a town in the northwestern part of Iincoln County In the Columbia River four miles above the mouth of the Sanpoil River there is a rapia locally known as Hell Gate. On July 3, 181l, itwas montioned as Strong Rapid by $\mathrm{D}_{\text {avid }}$ Thompson of the $\mathrm{N}_{\mathrm{o}}$ rthwest Company of Montreal. (T.C. Elliott in the Washington Historical warterly Harch 1914 page 44 note 5) Hell's Gate is alsoused as a name for rapids in the Columbia river three miles below Maryhill.

Hillyard now a part of pokane in Spokane county. It was platted as an indepade ent town on Ocbober 25, 1892 by $L_{\theta}$ la 18 . and Kate C. Westfall ,he na me was in honor of James J. Hill of the Great Northern $R_{\text {ailway }} C_{\text {omparm }}$ which built there the largest railroad shops west of St. Paul (Postmaster of $H_{i} 11$ yard in Names MSS Letter 194) On November 14, 1825, the place was referred to as Horse Plains by John Work of the Hudson's Bay Company (T.C. Eiliott in the Washington Historical quarterly July 1914 Pago 180 Meany)

Hock Spur, see Buckeye and Denison, Spokane county.

Home Valley a postoffice and settlement in the southern part of Skamania county. Hew Nrwegians settled in the little wiey surrounded by mountains and John Kanekeberg gave it to name of Heim Dal in 1893. The same jear hewa appointed postmaster and the gogernment -translated the name in to Home Valler (Nellie E. Youcham, in Names MSS Lett 346 Meany)

Horlick, a town in the central part of Kittitas county. H.R. Williams vice president of the Gicago, Milwaukee \& St. Paul Kallway says it was named after a baand of malted milk (IN Names MSS Letter 589. Meany)

Hunt's Junction, in Walla Walla county, named in honor of G.W. Hunt of the old Hunt Road. (Postmaster at ttalia in Names MSS $1^{\text {etter 134, Meany) }}$

Huntsville, a town in the west central portion of ${ }^{\text {Columbia }}$ County. D ${ }_{\mathrm{u}}$ ring the sQe winter of $1878-79$ members of the United Brethren church $r$ ais ed a fund of $\$ 10,000$ to eave endow a university. B.J. Hunt was manager. With John Fudge he donated ninety acres for a townsite which on being plat ted received the rame of Huntsvilie. School was begun there in the washington Institute on November 4, 1080 1879. (Illustrated History of Southeastern Washington page 374. $M_{\text {eany }}$

Hyak, the name of a lake and creek near the east por tal of the Chiago, Milwaukee \& St. Paul Kailway tunnel through the Cascade range in Kittitas county. 'He word is from the Chinook Jargon and means hurry. (meany)

Grouse Creek, in the southwestern part of Asotin county. "The grouse were very thick in the early days when I camehere, and there are quite a lot of them yet." (Henry Hansen of Hanson's Ferry in Names mSS, Letter 236 Meany)
